## The Calligrapher's Daughter

I was born in Taipei, Taiwan, the daughter of a calligrapher and a ceramic artist, so I grew up immersed in art and with a deep appreciation of the beauty of the Chinese language. Speaking and writing Chinese is an integral part of whol am and how I see the world. But it was only when I had children of my own that I properly understood what a difficult language Chinese is to learn.

Being of Taiwanese descent while raising my children in the UK has made me acutely aware of the differences, but also the similarities, between Eastern and Western cultures. The ultimate goal of Chineasy is to help bridge the cultural gap by demystifying the Chinese language, which acts as a barrier to so many people - my children included!

Chineasy is hugely personal to me. I have done many different things in my life. I consider myself to be part geek, part entrepreneur, part dreamer, and this project is a culmination of all these elements. My experience in technology ventures and my background as an entrepreneur with an artistic upbringing have given me the building blocks to make Chineasy possible, but it is my childhood and my children that have inspired me to make Chineasy a reality. I am proud to share Chineasy with all who want to learn and appreciate the beauty of the Chinese language.

## Why Chineasy?

China is home to ancient traditions, breathtaking artwork and what is currently one of the world's strongest economies. It comes as no surprise to me that recent years have seen a cultural trend of Eastern migration by both young people and business-minded individuals. Everyone is starting to pay more attention to China, Taiwan, Japan, South Korea and other Asian countries as they become increasingly popular tourist destinations and increasingly important as cultural, financial and industrial hubs.

Call me optimistic, but I see the melding of these two cultures, East and West, as being instrumental in creating a more culturally literate world. I also think that the East and West must understand each other in order for global economic growth to be sustainable. There is, however, a giant roadblock preventing the East and West from communicating effectively and connecting on a deep, cultural level: the Great Wall of Chinese.

The Chinese language has long been considered the most difficult major language to learn, largely on account of the vast number and complexity of the characters. When I began to teach my British-born children Chinese, I realized just how challenging its characters are for a native English speaker. It was like torture for my children! So I spent many years looking for a fun and easy way to teach them how to read Chinese.

After years of searching, I didn't think that any of the methods out there were engaging enough. So I did what any entrepreneur would do: I created my own method to learn how to read Chinese characters - Chineasy. And you know what? It works.

Chineasy's goal is to allow people to learn to read Chinese easily by recognizing characters through simple illustrations. The magical power of the Chineasy method is that, by learning one small set of building blocks (see p. 10), students can build many new characters and phrases. Master a few sets of building blocks, and your learning can be accelerated to a whole new level.

With very little effort, students can quickly learn to read several hundred Chinese characters and phrases, and gain a deeper understanding of the historical and cultural references of the vocabulary. Even though there are tens of thousands of Chinese characters, only a few hundred are actually necessary to comprehend basic Chinese literature, and to begin to delve into Chinese culture and art.

## How to Use the Book

## A quick overview

Each character in this book is introduced in its Chinese form，followed by its English translation and then its pinyin（the approximate sound of the character；see p．13）．Each building block and compound character（these terms are explained below）has a short introduction that teaches you some fun historical and cultural facts as you are learning the language．Also included are unillustrated phrases（e．g．see＇heart＇on p．87） that will help to expand your vocabulary．

At the end of the book there is a handy index that lists every character and phrase taught in Chineasy，and provides you with its traditional and simplified forms（see opposite）and its pinyin．

## Chineasy methodology

The Chinese language is traditionally taught through a series of between roughly 180 and 215 radicals．These radicals are then used to form the characters of the Chinese language．Chineasy has broken down this collection of characters into their most basic and recurring forms， allowing students to learn fewer and simpler radicals that we have termed＇building blocks＇

One building block（e．g．the character 火 for＇fire＇， see p．28），or a specific compound form of the building block（e．g．＇．．＇fire＇，see p．28），can be combined with one or more other characters to make a compound character（e．g．炎＇burning hot＇，see p．29）．Two or more independent characters can be placed next to one another to make phrases（e．g．炎炎＇blazing＇，see p．30）． In compounds，a whole new character is created； in phrases，the placement of characters next to one another gives a new meaning to the collection of characters．This principle of building blocks is what makes Chineasy so easy！

## Traditional or simplified？

Chineasy teaches mainly traditional Chinese，which is the written language of Taiwan and Hong Kong． Simplified Chinese was adopted in mainland China in 1949，after the end of the Chinese Civil War and the establishment of the People＇s Republic of China．Both traditional and simplified forms still share a great number of characters．Chineasy specifies in the character captions when the simplified form is used instead of the traditional form（e．g．＇to follow＇and＇crowd＇on p．17）．Where no distinction between forms is noted，the traditional and simplified forms of the character are the same．

## The evolution of Chinese

As in the case of all languages，Chinese has continuously evolved throughout the course of its existence．Political change，geographic expansion and philosophy have all influenced the stylistic form of Chinese characters．Throughout the book， you will see references to oracle－bone 甲骨文 （c． 1400 BCE），bronze script 金文（c． 1000 BCE）， seal script 筦書（c． 220 BCE）and clerical script隸書（c． 200 BCE）characters．These terms refer to periods in the evolution of Chinese writing from which the modern Chinese language is derived．

The most ancient Chinese characters were developed as logograms，and therefore do not usually indicate how they should be pronounced（see p．13）．However， as the Chinese language became more sophisticated， two or more building blocks were used to form new characters；in this case，one of those building blocks was chosen as the basis for the new character＇s pronunciation．For example，account／bill 賬（zhang ${ }^{4}$ ） on p． 85 comprises the building block for＇shell＇ （associated with wealth－see p．130），indicating the meaning of the compound character，and the character for＇length＇（chang ${ }^{2}$ ），which influences the pronunciation．（See also＇at＇on p．115．）

## Writing 101

Every child who studies Chinese has to go through this exercise when they learn how to write．Each character has to be drawn neatly inside a square．You can see that a single tree fits into a square the same size as the squares used for＇two trees＇and＇three trees＇．

You should see a slight alteration of the shape from the original＇tree＇：in order to fit two trees side by side in the square，you must make thinner trees．When three trees are stacked together，all the trees are shorter in order to fit into the square．

In Chinese，certain building－block characters have an alternate form that appears only when used as part of a compound．These characters are traditionally known as＇pianpang＇偏旁 On the right，you can see an example of this in the＇person＇人 $=1$ compound form in the compound＇group＇伙．Other examples of this alternate character form can be seen in＇dog＇ $犬=犭$ on p． 26 and＇fire＇火 $=\cdots$ on p． 28. Such compound forms are indicated by a note under the main caption for the building block．

See p． 35 for more information about writing Chinese．

Even though there are several different spoken Chinese dialects，such as Mandarin or Cantonese， they all share the same written characters；it is only the pronunciation of these characters that will differ from one dialect to another－often completely．

The＇pinyin＇pronunciation guide used in this book corresponds to Mandarin only，which is the most widely used Chinese dialect and counts over 960 million native speakers（out of a total of over 1.2 billion Chinese speakers）－see ＇Speaking 101＇opposite for more information about pronunciation．

## Spacing 101

How can you tell if you are reading a character （字）or a phrase（詞）？A character，whether it＇s a building block or a compound，fits within one square．

When you see two people squeezed together in a single square，you know it＇s a character－for example，the simplified character＇to follow＇从．

A phrase，on the other hand，is spaced across two or more squares．That means，if you see two or more characters spread across two or more squares，then you know it＇s a phrase－for example， ＇everyone＇人人．

The beauty of the Chineasy method is that you can construct many new＇words＇by combining existing characters．Chinese characters rarely appear alone； it is often only in the context of a phrase that the meaning of a character becomes clear．Learning phrases is a giant but easy step towards improving your Chinese study．

## Speaking 101

To teach Mandarin Chinese to non－native speakers， most teachers use pinyin，the only standard phonetic system for transcribing the sound of Chinese characters in the romanized alphabet． Chinese is a tonal language，so the pinyin system uses a series of either numerals or glyphs to represent tone．For instance，the pinyin for＇person＇ can be written as either ren ${ }^{2}$ or rén．Chineasy uses the numerical pinyin system．After every English translation，you will see a word in brackets followed by a number；this acts as a guide to the pronunciation of the character．See，for example， p． 16 人 person $\left(r^{2}\right)^{2}$ ．

When you put a line on top
of 'big' 大, it means 'sky' or 'heaven'. Traditionally, the line represented the spiritual level above man and earth. This character can also mean 'day'.

Can you tell the difference between these two characters? It is nearly impossible, but the difference is usually made evident by the meaning of the compound. It's useful to remember that 'to surround' never appears alone, so if you see a standalone $\square$, it is the character for 'mouth'.



## 吅 shout（xuan）

A mouth emits sound．
Two mouths emit even more sound！This is a rare character，so use it to show off to your Chinese friends！

品 quality（ $\mathrm{pin}^{3}$ ） Imagine that each mouth is an opinion．The quality of something is judged by what people say about it． This character also means ＇item＇，＇product＇or＇grade＇．

This character is a combination of＇mouth＇ and＇big＇．It also means ＇because of＇and＇reason＇． I like to remember it by thinking that a big mouth causes problems（although， in this case，口 means＇to surround＇）．

This character is a combination of a small ＇mouth＇and＇to surround＇． Imagine that it depicts a swirling whirlpool， continuously turning back on itself．

## 人品 morality

The regular form of this character is 'big' $t$ with an additional dot on the upper right side. The earliest form in oracle-bone inscriptions was a drawing of a dog, with the extra stroke representing its tail.

This character is the form of 'dog' that is used as a component in certain compounds.
See 'to stroll' on p. 113 for an example.



㕱 to bark（fei ${ }^{4}$ ）
This character is a combination of＇mouth＇ and＇dog＇．When a dog opens its mouth to emit a sound，it is barking．

## 哭 to cry（ku＇）

This character is a combination of＇dog＇ and two＇mouth＇building blocks．As the crying sound of a human sounds similar to the whine of a dog，this character means ＇to cry＇．

## 器 utensil（qii）

This character is a combination of＇dog＇ and four＇mouth＇building blocks．It can also mean ＇instrument＇．

The building block for 'fire' represents a central flame with a smaller spark on either side. It reminds me of a campfire. I like to remember this character by thinking about a person waving their arms, saying, 'Help! I'm on fire!'

This character is the form of 'fire' that is used as a component in certain compounds. When you see a compound with this character, it is normally related to fire or something hot. See 'lamb' on p. 41 for an example of this character.



## 炎 burning hot（yan ${ }^{2}$ ）

This compound comprises two＇fire＇building blocks stacked on top of each other．They are burning twice as hot as before． This character also means ＇inflammation＇．

## 炎炎 flames（yan ${ }^{4}$ ）

The building block for ＇fire＇represents one flame． Multiply that by three and you have a roaring fire．

In ancient China，fires were used mainly for cooking and for warmth． When people gathered around the fire，they were considered to be part of the group．

## 啖 to eat（dan ${ }^{4}$ ）

This character is a combination of＇mouth＇ and＇fire＇．It means＇to eat＇ or＇mouthful＇．Chinese food，especially food from Sichuan Province，can be very spicy，like a fire in your mouth as you eat．

## 炎炎 blazing

A blazing fire burns with incredible heat．You see this character used to describe weather，e．g． ＇blazing summer＇炎炎

## A lesson in burning anger！

Fire（火）is one of the five elements in traditional Chinese medicine．Each person is born with a unique composition of all five elements；it is this unique blend of elements that forms the basis of your personality and constitution．The＇qi＇（vital force） of the five elements waxes and wanes in daily and seasonal cycles．The theory behind Chinese medicine is that a person becomes sick owing to an imbalance of these elements．

Practitioners of traditional medicine believe that when there is an imbalance of the fire element，it results in a person suffering from anxiety，restlessness and insomnia．So the element of fire is associated with a person＇s temper． Theoretically，when a person＇s fire accumulates，so does the person＇s temper．They become angry！

represents a tree trunk with hanging branches. When this character is used as an adjective, it refers to a wooden texture. When it is used to describe a person, it means 'clumsy'. 'dumb' or 'numb'.



## 林 woods（lin²）

Two trees together make a wood，which is greater than a single tree．This character is also a common surname，pronounced＇Lin＇． It＇s actually my mother＇s surname．

## 森 forest（sen＇）

Three trees make a forest， which is greater than a tree or a wood．When used as an adjective，this character means＇dense＇，just like a thick cluster of trees．



本 foundation（ben ${ }^{3}$ ）來 to come（lai $\left.{ }^{2}\right)$
The foundation of a house is the first step in its construction，and traditionally foundations were made of wood． This character also means＇origin＇．

This character is a combination of＇tree＇and two＇person＇building blocks．In ancient China， ＇to come＇was represented by a character based on wheat，which had been brought to China from Europe．The simplified form is 来．

## Four ways furious

Is Chinese written horizontally or vertically？ Chinese can be written in either direction． You can read from left to right，right to left， or top to bottom．The only direction you won＇t find is bottom to top．

Today the most common style is from left to right，in the same way that English，French， Spanish or German are read．

In some ancient literature or on road signs in China，you will sometimes see phrases written from right to left．This can prove to be odd when you have literature that mixes both English and Chinese．I once saw a book cover that had the English title running from left to right and the Chinese title running from right to left！

If you are trying to read vertically（for example， you quite often have to do this if you are reading scrolls），then you would read from right to left， starting with the first vertical line on the right from top to bottom，and then moving towards the left of the scroll．

## 末 end（ $\mathrm{mo}^{4}$ ）

It looks as if the topmost branches of this tree have plateaued，Indicating that it has ended its growth．Make sure that the upper line is longer than the lower one！

## 羊 sheep (yang ${ }^{2}$ )

In Chinese, 羊 represents the goat-antelope group of mammals. The context, within a phrase or compound, determines if it refers to a sheep, goat or other animal. If you see 'sheep' in a compound character, it tends to relate to something sheep-like or nice and positive.



## 美 beautiful（mei ${ }^{3}$ ）

This character is a combination of＇sheep＇ and＇big＇．In ancient China， sheep were considered auspicious．This compound is also an abbreviation for the USA（see p．79）．

鮮 fresh（xian＇）
This character is a combination of＇fish＇on the left and＇sheep＇on the right．Originally it referred to a fish breed，but today has been extended to mean＇fresh＇．

## 羔 lamb（ $\mathrm{gao}^{1}$ ）

## Why two women together means＇argument＇

Sadly，it seems that when women are together，they quarrel． The character showing two women together represents ＇argument＇．This meaning is a product of Chinese history．

In the old days，it was inevitable that women in Chinese households ended up arguing．For hundreds of years，Chinese married couples lived together with their parents－in－law and the rest of their extended family．It was not unusual for four generations to live under the same roof．And sometimes mothers－in－law took revenge on their daughters－in－law for ＇stealing＇their sons．It was also common practice for wealthy Chinese men to have several wives（for example，my great－ grandfather，who was a landlord in Taiwan，had three）．To make sure that their own sons would inherit the lion＇s share of their husband＇s wealth，mistresses and wives sometimes ganged up on the newest concubines that their husbands brought home． No wonder that domestic conflict was often the norm！

By now you may have noticed that，in Chinese，a character rarely appears by itself．You often need to add another character in order to clarify the meaning in different contexts．Many phrases are constructed by repeating a character．On the next page， you will learn that 妹 means＇younger sister＇．In real life，you will more frequently see 妹妹（where妹 is repeated）to express ＇younger sister＇．This is very common practice in the Chinese language；see the example on $p .156$ ．The meaning of the phrase is made absolutely clear by repeating the character．Other examples you will see in this book are 人人（＇everyone＇，p．21），天天（＇every day＇，p．21），白白（＇in vain＇，p．63），媽媽（＇mama＇； see＇mother＇，p．77）and 公公（＇grandfather＇；see＇public＇，p．141）．

As in the case of many English words，a character may have different meanings depending on whether it is used as a noun， a verb or an adjective．For example，女 is＇woman＇，but when talking about＇a woman＇，you will more frequently see the phrase女人（p．49），where女 is the adjective＇female＇and 人 is the noun＇person＇．

Another example is＇forest＇．The character 森 on its own means
＇forest＇（p．33），but when we talk about＇a forest＇，we often use the phrase 森林（ $p .156$ ），where 森 is the adjective＇forest－like＇ used to describe the noun 林＇woods＇．
A final example is＇tomorrow＇．The character 明 can mean ＇bright＇，
＇brightness＇or＇tomorrow＇（p．57）．But you more frequently see the phrase 明日 used to refer to＇tomorrow＇（p．59），where 明 is used as an adjective to describe the noun 日＇day＇．

Traditionally more prized than silver and gold，jade was worn by kings and nobles throughout Asian history，and represented the virtues of beauty，grace and purity．

This character is a combination of＇to reveal＇ and＇soil＇，and originally referred to a place of worship．It has since evolved to mean＇society＇ or＇company＇．

This character is a combination of＇to reveal＇ and＇to explain＇．God is omnipotent and omniscient． He reveals secrets．

This character is a combination of＇to reveal＇ the number one，＇mouth＇ and＇field＇，and also means ＇good fortune＇or＇blessing＇． It is commonly written on red paper during Chinese New Year．

because the meaning of the character was＇to yawn＇．

Since the clerical change， the wide－open mouth is no longer discernible in this character．However， characters with 欠 as a component are often related to opening the mouth and exhaling．When one yawns，it means one is tired and short of energy． Therefore，an extended meaning of 欠 is＇to lack＇， which is commonly used in modern Chinese．

This character is a combination of＇mouth＇and ＇to owe＇．In this case，＇to owe＇means＇to yawn＇．

## 炊 to cook（chui）

This character is a combination of＇fire＇and＇to owe＇．In this case，＇to owe＇ means＇to blow＇，and refers to blowing the embers to cook your food．

This character is a combination of＇ice＇and＇to owe＇．It is used to refer to the number of times that something happens．For example，the phrase 二次 means＇twice＇．

This character is a combination of＇area＇區 and＇to owe＇．This character＇s pronunciation sounds similar to the English pronunciation of ＇Europe＇．The simplified form is 欧．

This character is a combination of 'roof' and 'dagger', and means 'it'.

This character is a combination of＇person＇ and＇dagger＇．It is often seen in words relating to chemistry，especially when referring to elements and substances．It also means ＇to melt＇or＇to convert＇．

## 指 finger（zhis）

This character is a combination of＇hand＇and ＇purpose＇旨，which is a combination of＇dagger＇ and＇sun＇．Fingers are what make your hands useful． The character also means ＇point＇when used as a verb．

## 花 flower（hua）

The character is a combination of＇grass＇and ＇to transform＇．Flowers might look a bit like transformed grass．
